1. No longer regulating course structure to be complementary and integrated.	School might schedule all classes first followed by drives. Some fear this model may negatively affect student learning.	<ul> <li>No studies or data validate this fear/belief</li> <li>Regulating course structure does not measure student outcomes</li> <li>Other states offer separate classroom and behind the wheel courses</li> </ul>
2. No longer regulating maximum allowance of absences.	<ul> <li>Schools may choose to allow unlimited misses.</li> <li>Schools may fail to identify and communicate their policy for missed classes.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>If a school allows for a student to miss, they will need to arrange for student to participate in an equivalent class make-up using the same information that was missed in class.</li> <li>Schools must ensure students are on the same lesson.
